Utility Assistance Program


Utility Assistance creates stability for individuals and the community. It builds financial security, health, and resilience.


CAT's Energy Assistance Program provides critical support to households facing energy insecurity, helping families cover essential utility costs through LIHEAP, OEAP, OLGA & GAP, water assistance, and other funding streams.

By easing the burden of high utility costs, energy assistance helps families avoid crises that can lead to financial instability or even homelessness. It's not just about covering bills; it's about creating stability. Supporting these programs means strengthening our entire community, ensuring that every family has a chance to thrive.

Reduced Financial Stress

Covering utility bills eases the burden on low-income families, allowing them to allocate resources to essentials like food and healthcare.







Increased Housing Stability

Utility support prevents disconnections, reducing risks of unsafe living conditions or eviction, which promotes stable housing and stronger community ties.

Breaking the Cycle

Utility aid prevents financial crises, helping families maintain stability and work toward self-sufficiency.



When Maria and her two young children moved into their new apartment after leaving an unsafe situation, everything felt uncertain.

She had just started a part-time job and was trying to rebuild a sense of stability for her family—but then the winter utility bills started arriving. The heating system in their building wasn't efficient, and despite careful use, the costs quickly piled up. Facing disconnection and not knowing where to turn, Maria reached out to the local Energy Assistance program and applied for help through LIHEAP.

Within weeks, Maria was approved for assistance. Not only did it cover the past-due amount and stop the shutoff notice, but it also helped reduce her bill for the rest of the heating season. The relief was immediate and profound—she could focus on her job, get her kids to school on time, and begin saving again. LIHEAP wasn't just a financial lifeline; it gave her breathing room and a fresh start when her family needed it most.


Supportive Housing

CAT's Supportive Housing programs help individuals and families not only get housed—but stay housed. Through tailored programs they support those experiencing homelessness, those with disabilities, and very low-income veterans on their journey toward long-term stability.

Housing First

Without a safe place to live, it's nearly impossible to find or keep a job, care for one's health, or build a future.

Housing Solutions' mission is to empower individuals and families to become self-sufficient by living within their means in affordable, permanent housing.




CAT staff work closely with clients to develop skills for independent living and long-term housing stability. This case management helps navigate challenges by advocating with landlords, neighbors, counselors, law enforcement, Social Security, and Veterans Affairs.











Just One Month

After their rental was suddenly sold, the Reyes family found themselves in a heartbreaking limbo. Laura and Miguel had already secured a new place—closer to their kids' school and Miguel's work—but the timing didn't line up. Their old lease ended before the new one began, and they simply didn't have the extra funds to cover both deposits and that awkward in-between month of rent. For a few nights, they stayed with a cousin. Then in their car. Then in a motel. Miguel kept going to work. Laura packed school lunches out of a cooler. They did everything right—but it wasn't enough.

That's when CAT's Housing Solutions team stepped in. Through short-term rent assistance, they were able to cover just that one missing month. With that support, the Reyes family moved into their new apartment on time, without falling further behind. It wasn't a huge grant or a long-term subsidy—it was a simple, timely investment in a family's stability. And it made all the difference.

Programs for Older Adults

This past year, CAT's Senior Services team made a real difference—helping older adults and people with disabilities stay independent, healthy, and connected.

Connection Over Isolation

Social programs and community visits combat loneliness, promoting mental health and quality of life for older adults.

76

Through programs like **Home Delivered Meals** and **Oregon Project Independence**, 76 seniors were able to keep living at home with the support they needed.

264

We also supported **264 individuals with disabilities** manage daily life while staying independent and in control.

276

Volunteers played a huge role—**276 people** stepped up to deliver meals, make friendly visits, and help out at senior centers-contributing over **6,000 hours** of service.

3,396

In total, we served **3,396 older adults** this year—offering everything from meals to wellness check-ins, all designed to keep people thriving at home, not in institutions.

This work is only possible thanks to strong community partnerships and a shared commitment to aging with dignity and choice.

Respite programs give family caregivers a much-needed break, helping them sustain their own health while continuing to support loved ones.

When the Safety Net Starts to Tear

Senior Services in Crisis—and the People Holding it Together

This year, our Senior Services team faced a perfect storm.

Skyrocketing food costs meant our Home Delivered Meals budget—
meant to last a year—ran dry after just seven months. Then, the
Saint Helens Senior Center abruptly closed, leaving dozens of older
adults without meals, connection, or their trusted community hub.

Through it all, our staff stepped up. They rerouted deliveries,

found new partners, and answered every call from scared, isolated seniors. Leading that charge was Julian Davis, our Senior

Programs Manager. Julian worked late nights, made tough calls, and held her team—and the community—together with compassion and determination. She is the kind of quiet hero this work


depends on.

Veteran Services Office

A Veteran's Service Officer is the advocate for Veterans, their families, and survivors. The VSO's mission is to ensure that Columbia County Veterans and their families receive all entitlements provided by Federal and State law.





The VSO has an understanding of the problems which confront Veterans and their families and knows the extent, the meaning, and the application of Federal Veteran's laws passed in the interest of Veterans and their dependents. The VSO assists in filing Federal VA claims for compensation, pension, other benefits, and as needed, represents Veterans through the appeal process. The VSO strives to achieve the highest quality service possible.

Healthy Families

Community Investment

CI works to strengthen the safety, stability, and sustainability of homes for low-income individuals and families across our service area.

Energy Programs

Reduce energy costs, increase energy efficiency, and ensure safe, livable environments through services like weatherization, energy education, and heating/cooling system replacements.

Weatherization

reduces energy costs by improving energy efficiency and promotes health and safety.

Heating/Cooling Replacement

supports families by repairing or replacing heating and cooling systems, ensuring homes remain safe, comfortable, and energy-efficient.


Energy Education

offers direct support through home visits, assisting families in making informed energy decisions.

Safe & Healthy Housing Preservation Programs

provide critical home repairs, accessibility upgrades, and health-related modifications. These programs protect vulnerable families, prevent displacement, and ensure safe, livable homes across our region.

Community Action Team believes that investing in the local community. Connecting individuals in need with the local services available to help them step out of poverty and into self-sufficiency is the most effective way to reduce the incidence and effects of poverty. This includes everything from referring clients to the Department of Human Services to enroll in SNAP benefits to employing local contractors to complete Housing Rehabilitation and Weatherization projects.

Provided 159 jobs through housing rehabilitation and weatherization contracts


CAT served 7,984 persons and 4,244 households. 47% were children or seniors, and 42% were either employed or on Social Security. The economic impacts of this service year included:
